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THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN ENTREPRENEURIAL RESILIENCE, SERVANT LEADERSHIP AND SUSTAINABILITY ORIENTATION

ABSTRACT

Objective:

The purpose of this research is to deeply investigate the relationship between entrepreneurial resilience, servant leadership and sustainability orientation. Recently, Batool et al. (2022) investigate the relationship between servant leadership and organisational sustainability, underlying the mediation role of creativity and employees' psychological resilience. But nothing is said about the role of entrepreneurial resilience. In particular, nothing is said about the relationship between the resilience of the entrepreneur and the leadership style in small- and medium-sized enterprises (Hutchinson et al., 2021), and the interdependences between resilience, leadership and sustainability orientation. Since the strong association between leadership and resilience (Förster and Duchek, 2017) and the (underdeveloped) link between entrepreneurial resilience and sustainability orientation (Khizar et al., 2022; Schutte and Mberi, 2020), in this research we want to well-defined the relationship between entrepreneurial resilience, leadership style and sustainability orientation, considering this last factor in its three pillars (i.e., social, environmental and economic sustainability). Our research questions are the followings:

RQ1: Does the entrepreneurial resilience affect the leadership style in small firms?

RQ2: If and how the previous relationship affects the sustainability orientation?

Methodology:

We want to collect data from small- and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs), since the close relationship between the characteristic of the owners of these companies and the concept of servant leadership (van Dierendonck, 2011), the crucial role of entrepreneurial resilience in fostering organisational resilience in this type of firms (Branicki et al., 2018) and the fact that they are the backbone of our socio-economic system (Alberti et al., 2018), a prominent role in contributing to a sustainable society.

In order to test our research questions, we will implement an explanatory sequential mixed method (Creswell and Creswell, 2018, p. 222), "a two-phase data collection project in which the researcher collects quantitative data in the first phase, analyses the results, and then uses the results to plan (or build on to) the second, qualitative phase".

Originality:

Theoretically speaking, our research could stimulate a fruitful research stream in leadership and entrepreneurship studies, combining resilience and sustainability.

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In introducing entrepreneurial resilience as a new antecedent for servant leadership, our research suggests that both personal and professional (negative) experiences and their successive elaboration can lead to a specific leadership style, influencing the orientation in implementing actions for the community in terms of sustainability. This research can contribute to rethink the idea of business and the idea of a future, more fraternal economy.

Results:

We expect to shed some light on the relationship between the previous mentioned concepts. In the first phase of the research we expect to classify (in a matrix) the entrepreneurs according to their value of resilience and leadership style. In the second stage, we expect to underly the differences of the characteristics of the entrepreneurs in terms of sustainability orientation.

Practical implications:

Our research can contribute to explore the best leadership style in stimulating a "fraternal" and sustainable success. Thanks to this research, an entrepreneur can be more aware toward her/his past experiences, her/his actions and how she/he can contribute to the flourishing of the community. The personal human development should become the bridge for the community development.

Research limitations:

The main limitation of our research could be represented by the measurement of our variables, since the literatures related to this concepts lack of scholarly (total) agreement on their operationalisation and measurement (Branicki et al., 2018; Khizar et al., 2022; van Dierendeonck, 2011).
